## Scalia Among 90 Authors At Nov. 18 NPC Book Fair

Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia, veteran journalists **Helen Thomas** and Roger Mudd, and professional wrestler Bret Hart will be among 90 authors at the 31st Annual NPC Book Fair Tuesday, Nov. 18. One of the Club's premier events, the fair -- open to the public -- will also feature Sen. Mel Martinez, R-Fla.; Kerry Kennedy, youngest daughter of Robert Kennedy; sports author William Nack; former *New York Times* columnist Russell Baker and ABC News correspondent Jim Wooten, featuring the work of their friend and colleague, the late David Halberstam; author James Reston, Jr.; former Rep. Ben Jones, D-Ga., star of "The Dukes of Hazzard;" adventure author Stephen Coonts; and historian **Eleanor Herman**. Also in attendance will be renowned artist Wendell Minor, who has designed the commemorative poster for this year's event. Others attending will be Reps. Loretta and Linda Sanchez (both D-Calif.), the first sisters to serve in the House of Representatives; Rep. Barbara Lee, D-Ca.; Sen. Jim DeMint, R-N.C.; celebrity chefs, including *Bon Appetit* editor-in-chief Barbara Fairchild, Kennedy family chef Neil Connolly, and "Made in Spain" star José Andrés. All authors will sign their books, but no outside books are permitted.

## To Explain Election Dean Cites Hope, Unity; Duncan Cites Spending

The Democratic and Republican National Committee chairmen paid homage to their candidates, American voters, and the political process Nov. 5 at a sold-out National Press Club Luncheon. A proud and admittedly sleep-deprived Howard Dean, Democratic National Committee (DNC) chairman, announced that America chose hope over fear and unity over division when it elected Barack Obama with 52 percent of the vote (349 electoral votes, as of the morning of Nov. 5) compared to 46 percent (163 electoral votes) for McCain. Dean noted that four years ago the Luncheon held the day after the election was a different experience for the Republican National Committee (RNC). Indeed, Robert M. (Mike) Duncan, RNC chairman, was an active member of the party when George W. Bush was re-elected for his second term in 2004. Today, the RNC chairman congratulated Obama and the other democrats who won their races. He said that Sen. John McCain led a heroic campaign and is a credit to his party and country. Duncan attributed McCain's loss to the fact that Obama was able to outspend Republicans by 3- or 4-to-1 in some states, and referred to Obama's effort as "the most successful Republican moderate campaign since Dwight Eisenhower."

## Sprint Is OK, Says CEO, But Fears Regulation of Internet

Sprint CEO Dan Hesse told an Oct. 24 Luncheon that despite the Wall Street meltdown, his company has a positive cash flow and “plans to revolutionize the wireless industry,” but warned against moves toward “net neutrality” proposed by some Democrats. “Regulating the Internet has horrendous implications,” declared the ex-AT&T executive. Reacting to current economics, Hesse evoked laughter when he said a friend told him the financial nosedive is worse than divorce because “I lost half my wealth but still have my wife.” But, Hesse said, Sprint “can get through this as long as we have a good cash position,” noting that the company is riding a wave of “robust growth in Internet use of mobile phones” with 262 million U.S. customers. Worldwide, he said 6.6 billion people use mobile phones, with 1,000 people per minute signing up. Noting that “business is saving billions” by using mobile phone technology, he predicted that mobile phones will generate \$860 billion a year in increased productivity.

## Club’s Oldest Member Is 108; Longest Tenured Is 70 Years

As the Club marks its Centennial, several members have been around for most of that time. The longest-serving NPC member is **George Bookman**, 94, of New York City, who joined in 1938, just 30 years after the Club was formed. Now retired, Bookman worked for *U.S. News*, *The Washington Post*, and *Time* magazine. **Harry F. Byrd, Jr.**, also 94, of the Rockingham Publishing Co. in Winchester, VA, also joined in 1938 following Bookman. Then in 1940 came **Austin Kiplinger**, **Diana Denny**, and **Penn Kimball**, followed by **William Payne** in 1941, then **Carl Hartman** and **Geraldine Rhoads** in 1942. Rhoads is also a Lifetime Member, along with **Estelle Jackson**, who joined in 1953. But these veterans are not the oldest members. That title is held by **Bradley Nash**, 108, of Harpers Ferry, WV; **Milton Ferguson**, 105, of New York City, and **Alden Waite**, 101, of Berkeley, CA. Celebrating longtime members, the NPC Owls held their annual “Hoot” Oct. 16 (Silver Owls have 25 or more years as members, Golden Owls 50 or more). Past Club President **John Cosgrove**, 90, says there are now some 700 Owls still hooting, so hang in there -- the best is yet to come!

Marin Alsop, who became the first woman music director-conductor of a major American symphony orchestra – the Baltimore Symphony – a year ago, will speak at a Club Luncheon Monday, Nov. 17. Her topic will be “Creating an Innovative Society Through Arts-Based Education.” The daughter of parents who were both musicians, Alsop began studying the piano at age 2, the violin at age 5, and at age 9 saw Leonard Bernstein conduct.

## Nader Asks Liberals to Press Demands on Dem Nominees

Ralph Nader does not agree with the right wing of the Republican Party on any issue. But, he said at an Oct. 24 Newsmaker, he does admire the way that it makes GOP presidential nominees pay attention to its agenda. In contrast, he observed, the Democratic Party’s liberal and progressive wings don’t make the same demands of Democratic nominees – which sets back the causes that inspired Nader to run as an independent candidate for the third election in a row. “Votes have to be conditioned,” he said. In Nader’s view, Democratic presidential nominee (now president-elect) Barack Obama was receiving support of liberals despite embracing policies they oppose, such as backing the bailout of financial markets, voting for a bill that allows domestic eavesdropping on potential terrorism suspects and supporting offshore drilling. Nader was critical of the mainstream media for ignoring his campaign, and expressed disappointment that the National Press Club had not invited him to address a Luncheon.

## Rockwell Painting to Travel

The Club has been honored by a loan request for one of our prized possessions -- Norman Rockwell's painting, "A Country Editor" -- to hang in an exhibit of Rockwell's work at the Norman Rockwell Museum in Stockbridge, Mass. The 1946 painting currently hangs outside the Reliable Source and depicts an old-fashioned newspaper office with messengers, upright typewriters and a picture of a GI on the wall. The Board of Governors has voted unanimously to approve the loan for the exhibit, which is planned for Nov. 7, 2009 through May 24, 2010. Negotiations are underway for the museum to pay insurance and shipping costs to and from the exhibit. The museum will offer the art that watches over the NPC day in and day out to a wider audience.

## Billy Joel Dazzles NPC With Singing, Stories

He was billed as talking about celebrity endorsements of political candidates at his sold-out Luncheon appearance Oct. 23, but Grammy award-winning singer, songwriter and pianist Billy Joel quickly went for the questions, of which there were many, from Club President **Sylvia Smith** and an audience full of longtime fans. The epitome of affluent, aging, urban cool in a medium gray suit and black t-shirt, the 59-year-old Joel was also refreshingly self-deprecating about his performing abilities. "I am a piano player, and not all that good, despite what people might think," Joel said. "The guy in the lobby is probably a better pianist than I am. I happen to be able to figure out how to write songs and I can sing in key when I try." He told amusing stories of the pop legends he has worked with — including Ray Charles, Paul McCartney, Elton John, and, just recently, Bruce Springsteen, often punctuating the stories with snippets of their songs that he played at the gleaming baby grand piano brought in for his use.
